Sacred Heart College School Review

This week, the College completed the first two days of a formal school review. This review was facilitated by reviewers, Graeme Luck and Meredith Nolte on behalf of Melbourne Archdiocesan Catholic Schools (MACS). The review process requires the College to undertake a comprehensive self-reflection on all aspects of school life, with the reviewers completing an exhaustive series of interviews to validate and/or suggest alterations to these findings. Under the current lockdown arrangements, all interviews were conducted online via Zoom and I would like to thank everyone involved for their patience and resilience in making the review a success.

The review will conclude a Dialogue and Engagement day next month where the College Leadership Team will explore the final report with the reviewers and MACS representatives. The review's findings and recommendations will provide significant material for the College's next Strategic Plan and Master Plan.

Everyone in the Sacred Heart College community remains particularly hopeful that the current state lockdown will conclude next week with a possible return to onsite learning on Wednesday 28 July 2021. Subject Selection for 2022 Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11

Planning for 2022 begins in Term 3, with Subject Selection for Year 9, 10 and 11 students. This is an exciting time of the year, as students consider their pathway through the Senior School, whether it is the start or nearing the end of this journey. All students will attend a Subject Selection Information Session. They will also receive instructions to access support in this process.

The Subject Selection process is paperless and will continue whether or not we are in remote schooling. All students select their subjects via online Web Preferencing. Students will receive an email containing an individualised link for the online selection website.

Operoo notifications:

- The assigned parent/guardian to Operoo will receive a notification for specific Subject Selection. This will contain all the relevant information.
- The assigned parent/guardian confirms the selected subjects and acknowledges the selection process. This parent/ guardian, and the individual student, must read and sign the acknowledgement.
- Any student wishing to accelerate on a VCE or VET subject must complete the Application to Accelerate Operoo. All
 relevant information regarding the acceleration process is within this Operoo. The assigned parent/guardian and
 student must sign the acknowledgement if a student applies to accelerate in a subject.

• Zoom links for Parent Subject Selection Information session is in the respective year level Operoo.

This week is Child Safe week at Sacred Heart College. Child Safe is a Victorian law that keeps children safe both at school and in the community. It protects children under 17 years of age from abuse or neglect. All staff, students and parents receive Child Safe education from Sacred Heart College. The parents, via Operoo, and staff have received their education presentation this week. We have decided not to deliver the student Child Safe education session until we are back on site. We feel that delivering this in person, with the opportunity to ask questions and clarify understanding, is a much preferred option. Consequently we have made the decision to delay this presentation until Week 4, where we will include it as part of Wellbeing week.

As we find ourselves back in lockdown and back to remote learning. This brings its own very unique set of challenges for both students, parents and teachers. Please ensure that you refer to both the Parent Guide and Student Guide to remote schooling as a quick reference. These have lots of very useful information, including what to do if your child experiences internet difficulties or needs additional wellbeing support.

Here are five tips for successful remote learning with your child:

- 1. Have a dedicated space for **learning**. Many parents have already set up a space in their house for their child to complete their school work.
- 2. Create routines, not schedules. Getting up, having breakfast, brushing teeth keep to a normal routine as much as possible.
- 3. Take brain breaks. Breaks away from the screen whenever possible.
- 4. Move for wellbeing.
- 5. Stay in contact with teachers.

An area of concern for many of our parents, particularly now we are all working remotely, is online safety. The eSafety Commissioner provides opportunities for parents to be more engaged in their children's safety online through a series of webinars on specific topics that are challenging for parents to monitor and manage.


The Young Mercy Leaders Conference - Year 9 Students Perspective






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An Indigenous Immersion Trip with a local flavour

Each year students in Years 10 and 11 from Sacred Heart College can apply to participate in our Indigenous Immersion Trip to Jarlmadangah Burru (250 kms East of Broome). This trip offers our students a hands-on experience of the uniqueness of Aboriginal culture, spirituality and language with a key component of this visit being time spent in classroom activities at the Nyikina Mangala Community School.

After 18 months of back and forth and uncertainty the 2020 Jarlmadangah group were able to set off on their much-awaited adventure... almost. As a result of Victoria's lockdowns and struggles with the virus we weren't allowed to visit the community in Western Australia, understandably. Ms Tanner and Mr Minter were extremely considerate and worked to find away for us to still get to have this experience and have our work pay off. So finally, on 24 June, Jack Turner, Kate Bartlett, Lincoln Roberts, Hayden Clune, Carmen Moore, Aleshia Vella, Tegan Hickey, and myself set off for



Warrnambool in the south west of the state. With Mr Minter driving, and Lincoln on music, we spent the three-hour journey excitedly looking at the many wind turbines scattered along the way. After some unsuccessful whale watching, and an entire-ly fictitious backstory from John the whale watcher we headed to Budj Bim, a cultural landscape on Gunditjmara country.

We were greeted by our tour guide Pam as well as the rain, much to the dismay of those of us with puffer jackets. Pam is a local indigenous woman, and told us about her culture and showed us around the oldest aquaculture sites in the world, the eel traps. Being female she was able to show us how they would weave the baskets and traps, despite her Aunty's hesitation to teaching her as a result of the stolen generation. Pam encouraged us to try some of the bush tucker in the area, and gave us the opportunity to try on a possum skin coat that are used to tell the story of indigenous people and are buried with them. The most moving thing that we were shown at Budj Bim was the war memorial, a circle with wood burnings to represent the civil wars that have occurred in each state, as those at Budj Bim felt that the Avenues of Honour that are in many towns didn't properly represent war in Australia.

On Friday we headed to Tower Hill, Victoria's largest dormant volcano. We got to take in the beautiful scenery and hear about the weapons that were used by the people of that area and learn more about Black Law. Once again, we were given the opportunity to eat some of the bush tucker from the area and we were also greeted by a very cute koala. Although it wasn't the experience we all thought we would have at Jarlmadanga, it was still an incredibly rewarding experience. We are incredibly thankful that Sacred Heart, along with Ms Tanner and Mr Minter, ensured we were still given this opportunity.

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to advise all parents and guardians that it collects certain information about your child's school, its staff, and student body.

Why is this information collected?

This information is collected by the department in accordance with the *Australian Education Act 2013* (the Act) and the *Australian Education Regulation 2013* (the Regulation). The Act and the Regulation require the legal entity responsible for the administration of the school (the Approved Authority) to provide certain information to the department. The department collects this information to:

- Ensure the provision of Australian Government funding to schools is properly calculated and appropriately managed.
- Conduct research, statistical analysis and develop school education policy for the Australian Government.
- Meet national and international reporting obligations on school students in Australia.
- Publish and provide information about schools to the public.

How is information collected?

Information is provided to the department by a school or their approved authority via various data collections on the <u>SchoolsHUB website</u>.

What information is collected?

Each data collection fulfils a separate reporting requirement. The data collections conducted through SchoolsHUB are:

- The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (Address collection) provides student residential addresses (excluding student names), and the names and addresses of parents/guardians of students for eligible full or part-time primary and secondary students enrolled at most non-government schools.
- The Financial Accountability (FA) assurance activity is done to certify that the financial assistance provided by the Australian Government for schools has been spent or committed to be spent to provide school education.
- The Financial Questionnaire (FQ) reports the income, expenditure, assets and liabilities from all non-government Australian schools receiving Australian Government recurrent grant funding.
- Student Attendance (STATS) provides a school's student attendance rate data by grade, gender and indigeneity from non-government schools for full-time students in Years 1 to 10 attending regular and special schools.
- The Non-Government Schools Census (Census) provides information about the number and characteristics of the school's staff and student body during a specific reference period. Characteristics include student year level and workload, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff and students, students with disability, students receiving distance education, boarding students, and overseas students. The names of students and staff are not collected, apart from


