PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE - Dr Darren Egberts

This week's prayer recognises the start of Lent this week with Ash Wednesday. The forty days of Lent are a fundamental part of the Christian tradition as preparation for the Easter Triduum of the Last Supper, Good Friday and the glory of Easter Sunday. Lent calls all faithful Christians to the threefold challenge of daily prayer, almsgiving and fasting. The sacrifice and personal discipline required to achieve these provide a touchstone for the ongoing challenge that is living a life after the example of Christ.

To mark the beginning of the school year for all Catholic school students in the Archdiocese of Melbourne, Archbishop Peter Comensoli has issued a letter to all families. The letter follows my article below.

Remote Learning and Teaching

Sacred Heart College Visitors' QR Code

Visitors can scan the QR code by opening up their smartphone's camera and allowing it to focus on the code. The smartphone will then generally identify


Our 2020 graduate destinations

It is always pleasing to see that our graduates have sound opportunities beyond Sacred Heart. This group of students experienced the most tumultuous year in living memory, but their resilience shone through. We wish them well as they begin their new courses or start work in their new careers.

The data on destinations is compiled by Karina Wheeler and she noted some interesting facts:

- Higher Education is still the number one destination for our students.
- 77% accepted into higher education. (80% of those having been offered one of their top 3 preferences).
- 4% awaiting offers.
- **12%** achieving apprenticeships. This has **grown from 8% in 2019 and 6% in 2018**, a great outcome for VCAL students this year.
- **6%** in employment and **1%** awaiting a pathway outcome.
- Over the last 3 years, La Trobe, ACU and RMIT remain the top three Universities of choice. The study area of Arts is the top choice and has been over the last 3 years, followed by the study area of Science. Interestingly to note Science has grown in popularity since 2019, but Arts still remains the preferred choice.

This year **Monash was more popular than University of Melbourne**. This may be due to the fact that we had a larger number of students wanting to study **double degrees**, for example Art and Science.


CSEF Applications (Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund)

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or are temporary foster parents are eligible to apply. This applies to families who hold a Current Veterans Affairs Gold Card, a Health Care Card or a Pensioner Concession Card.

The government will pay \$225 directly to the College, and the College will match this amount. A total of \$450 will be credited to your Family School Fee account for each student. Time Management and Study in Year 12 VCE

With the ongoing impacts of the pandemic, students are to be encouraged to practise good time management skills and strategies whilst at home and/or at school.

Time management is key to getting the most out of students' final year of secondary schooling. We want our students to achieve their best results, whilst staying healthy and happy. Students need to try and maintain a balance of school work, recreation, time with family and friends, and most importantly enough sleep. The following is some advice that was provided to our Year 12 students on their first day back this year:

- Aim for completing 3 hours of additional revision/study time per subject per week
 - Break this up into 30-45-minute blocks (don't try to study for 3 hours on one topic/subject)
 - Remember your study periods at school can be included in this so don't waste them
- Complete a weekly study timetable and include time for eating, sleeping, recreation and part-time work, as well as your time for study
 - Consider the best times for you to do your study e.g. Are you a morning or an evening person?
 - This is time to complete homework, but also to revise what you have learned during the day, make summaries and/or quizlets, and attempt practice questions
 - Use your study timetable and/or to-do lists to tick off tasks as you complete them, this will give you a good sense of achievement
- Start the year the way you plan to continue so that you get into some good habits early on.

Accessing PAM (Parent Access Module)

If you are a new parent/guardian you will have been sent PAM log in details from Mr Brendan Murphy by email. If it is not in your inbox please check your spam folder. Follow the prompts to log onto PAM.

As a parent/guardian you are able to:

- View assessment tasks and classwork that are due for your child
- View Daily Messages
- Access the calendar for up and coming events
- Important Documentation for Parents

In order to do so you need to enter PAM via the Sacred Heart College Website - <u>CLICK HERE</u>. Please do not try to log on to the SIMON site that your child has access to for school information.

If you are parents/guardians who share custody of your children, you are able to get your own access to PAM by contacting the school Registrar, Ms Denise Lawrence, <u>dlawrence@shckyneton.catholic.edu.au</u>. Details will be forwarded to enable you to gain access.



Year 7 Immunisations 2021

Every day vaccination saves lives and makes it possible for Victorians to live free from the illness and disability caused by many infectious diseases. All Year 7 Victorian secondary students have the opportunity to receive the following free vaccines.

Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) – single dose Human papillomavirus (HPV) – 2 doses (minimum 6 months apart)

Year 7 students at Sacred Heart College will receive their immunisations on Friday 26 March and Friday 22 October

Local councils deliver the program and schools distribute the vaccine information and consent card booklets.

The *Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations* authorise schools to release parent and student information to local councils so that councils can follow up with parents after the consent card booklets have been distributed.

This means that we will provide Macedon Ranges Shire Council with your contact details, and a local council immunisation representative may contact you with vaccine program information.

If you do not wish for your details to be provided to Macedon Ranges Shire Council, please advise me in writing before close of business on 19 February 2021.

If you are unable to contact me by the above date, you will need to contact the immunisation officer responsible for the vaccine program at Macedon Ranges Shire Council, in the event that you have queries about your contact details.

The next step will be to read the information provided in your child's consent card booklet and complete all sections. Detach Part A with all fields completed, and return to the College. Without returning Part A of the consent card booklet, a student may miss the opportunity to be vaccinated.

It is important this section is completed and returned to the school, regardless of whether you consent for your child to be vaccinated **or not** as part of the school-based program. Please have consent cards returned to the College by Friday 19 February 2021.

A minor change to the process for 2021 is:

1. 12 years and under Girls' Australian Football will be offered. All nominees will go direct to State Trials. 12 years and under Girls Football (Soccer) will not be required to go through stages of selection. All nominees will go direct to State Trials.

NEWS FROM THE CLASSROOM - Food Technology - Belinda Kime

Food Technology classes at Sacred Heart have been travelling along nicely with lots of enthusiasm from the students.

Year 7s and 8s have been learning about the importance of hand washing and navigating their way around the kitchen with a kitchen scavenger hunt. They have made chocolate truffle balls and French toast.

Year 9s have revisited kitchen safety and hygiene. They have practised their pastry making skills by producing both pasties and apple and cinnamon turnovers.

Year 11s had an opportunity to make fresh bread. The kitchen smelt amazing as it was baking! Putting theory into practice, they applied their knowledge of the development of early agriculture and how survival was dependent on the cultivating of wild crops such as wheat, drying the grains and turning them into flour.

Year 12s looked at the science behind coagulation and demonstrated their knowledge by poaching an egg and making Eggs Florentine. It was interesting to see the differences in poaching an egg when it was placed straight into boiling water, had no vinegar or the perfect environment of heat, vinegar and a whirlpool.
