

Arrangements for Upcoming Camps

Thankfully, the return to school and onsite learning has not been accompanied by a parallel rise in Covid-19 infections amongst our students and staff to any significant degree. It has been pleasing to see students respecting the health guidelines in place and Sacred Heart College has appreciated the support of parents, carers and families in alerting us to any students being isolated due to positive results or as household contacts.

We expect there to be announcements in coming days of easing of the current Omicron restrictions in schools and more broadly and these will be communicated to families as they come through.

The weeks to come will see a number of year levels departing on their annual camps and retreats; camps are a crucial part of the Sacred Heart College program, a fact borne out in the last two years when they have been few and far between.

To ensure that our camps and retreats program is as safe and secure as possible, Sacred Heart College has introduced a number of additional measures in light of the ongoing Covid-19 challenges. These additional measures are detailed in the Operoo each family will receive ahead of the camp or retreat but in brief:

- Parents are asked to ensure that students heading off on camp undertake a RAT within 48 hours of departure for camp/retreat;
- Students who are symptomatic on the morning of camp will not be allowed to attend;
- If a student displays flu-like symptoms on camp, they will be expected to complete a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT) after parents have been informed. If positive, they will be isolated and collected from the camp venue.
- Any students displaying flu-like symptoms will need to be collected from camp irrespective of their infection status.
- Students who sleep in the same bunk room or dormitory are considered household-like contacts if a Covid-positive case occurs and, in this case, would be isolated and undergo a RAT following parent contact.
- A range of additional Covid-SAFE measures have been put in place by SHC staff and the camp operators to minimise mixing of students indoors and to ensure safety and hygiene.

MOBILE PHONES

The beginning of any year is the time to remind both parents and students about the use of mobile phones. The College realises that almost all students own a mobile phone. We request that phones remain at home. The technological capacity of these mini computers is increasing with every new release, making them very powerful tools for communication. We have stopped short of banning mobile phones, as we realise that as a regional College and with many split households, being able to communicate arrangements at the end of the day can be very important. This is where the use ends however. We do not allow mobile phone use at school. They are difficult to monitor as you can imagine, can be distracting and be the source of distress. If students must have their phone at school, our policy, titled 'Responsible Use of Digital Devices' is on the College website states: *Mobile phones are to remain switched off and in student lockers during the school day. Parent contact needs to be made through general reception or the relevant student offices.*

Students need to keep their locker locked to protect their things, and we discourage valuable items being brought to school as their safety cannot be guaranteed. The following is the College procedure if students are caught with or using their phone during the school day.

SCHOOL CROSSING AND BIKE HELMETS

We have been approached by the local police concerned that Scared Heart students have been observed riding their bikes without helmets. They are happy for the College to remind students about this, but will begin issuing fines if there continues to be non-compliance. If your child rides their bike to school, please remind them of the importance of wearing a helmet.

The police have also asked all schools to remind students of the correct way to cross the roads – by the crossings. High Street in particular is really busy at each end of the day. There are Crossing guards, who need to be listened to. The crossing of roads incorrectly is a potentially dangerous practice, and we ask parents/carers to reinforce this at home as we will also be doing this at school.

UNIFORM

The College uniform is evolving into a series of options that make it very gender neutral. Students are able to wear whichever Summer option they are comfortable with. We do expect however that whichever option is worn, it is worn correctly. Dress length is to the knee, PE uniform is not to be worn on a non-PE day, and shoes need to be the correct, black leather school shoes. Hair below the shoulders needs to be tied back. No visible piercings other than one small stud or sleeper in each ear. Clear plastic invisible studs may be worn, but not plastic sleepers in the nose. Other jewellery must not be visible. 

School Fee Arrangements

A reminder to all families that parents who wish to take advantage of the \$200 per student lump sum payment discount must complete payment in full by 28 February.

For all families not paying via lump sum, please note that Sacred Heart College offers Direct Debit Payment Plans - please complete a <u>Payment Plan</u> and submit to the College ASAP.

CSEF Applications (Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund) - Closing Date 24/06/2022

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or temporary foster parents are eligible to apply. This applies to families who hold a Current Veterans Affairs Gold Card, a Health Care Card or a Pensioner Concession Card.

For eligible families the government will pay \$225 directly to the College, and the College will match this amount. A total of \$450 will be credited to your Family School Fee account for each student. For card holders, please complete a CSEF application form.

SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS - Paul Matthews, Head of Senior School

It's great to be back in the classroom and getting into the full swing of the new academic year. It was great to see how engaged Senior Students were in the goal setting program, Thursday 3 February. All students were given time to reflect on their progress from Semester two (2021), then set goals for this semester, based on areas they feel they need to improve. On Thursday 3 March, the Senior School will be given time to review their progress towards their goals.

It won't be too long before assessment tasks start for all subjects. Being consistent with study outside the classroom is an important strategy for all students. The completion of homework supports the learning that takes place in the classroom. For homework it is **highly recommended** students follow the guidelines below:

- Year 10 subjects: at least 1 hour per subject per week
- VCE Unit 1 and 2 subjects: at least 2 hours per subject per week
- VCE Unit 3 and 4 subjects: at least 3 hours per subject per week

Working consistently throughout the term is an effective way to approach assessment tasks. Being prepared for an assessment task with give students confidence, allowing them to demonstrate their understanding of the content. Learning to manage levels of stress can also assist them to work effectively and enjoy their studying. The link:





The students had a great time – there were lots of smiles and laughter. Upon returning to school the students wrote a response about their experience, for their Personal Development Skills Unit.
























Collection Notice for parents/guardians 2022 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to notify you that a request has been made for your child's school to provide residential address and other information as required under the *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.

The school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- Names and residential addresses of student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- Student residential address (excluding student names)
- Whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- Whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

The school collects the above information by generating a **unique and unidentifiable** – student reference number (SRN) for each student record. The SRN is also **only** used by the school for this collection. **It is not allowed to be used for any other purpose**. The number only indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the Collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need basis.

The information collected will be used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with data held by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to calculate a non-government school community's anticipated capacity to contribute to the costs of schooling.

From 2020, a new measure of capacity to contribute, the Direct Measure of Income (DMI), was introduced. The DMI is based on the median income of parents or guardians of students at a non-government school using data collected through the Collection. More information about the DMI can be found on the *Quality Schools Package* page on the departmental website.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with Privacy Act and the *Australian Education Act 2013* and *Australian Education Regulation 2013*.
