Lent



All currently enrolled VCAL students will transition to the VCE Vocational Major course or the Pathways Certificate in 2023. A number of key staff are attending information sessions run by the VCAA throughout Term One to make sure that we are ready for this alteration to our curriculum program next year.

Information on this significant change was included in a newsletter last year, but we will send out updated information well before Year 10 students have to make their subject choices later this year.

THE LANGUAGE WE USE

Last year at this time, I spoke about how due to our periods of isolation, we were seeing many norms and behaviours being challenged across society, and how the language we use towards each other was one of these. Fast forward to 2022, and it seems that for some this is still the case.

Our language is an obvious reflection of ourselves. No one likes to be spoken to rudely, nor hear others experiencing this. This is not only upsetting but can make people think differently about the person directing these comments. If this language escalates to be sexist or racist or homophobic, it can have far greater ramifications, not only for the recipient but also on the reputation of the perpetrator. It can mean the end of relationships, a person's confidence or their willingness to go to school. It may prevent them from pursuing or participating in the things they love, cause them to withdraw by seriously affecting their self-esteem, and in the worst-case scenario, to self-harm or suicide. These comments are often accompanied with 'I was only joking' when challenged, but this is not a joke. It is never the intention of the perpetrator that counts, but the perception of the victim that is considered. We do not want any of our students to feel different or less worthy as a result of these types of comments and we deal seriously with them if they come to light. It is not OK to say mean things to other people, to question a young persons' sexual orientation or make a racist remark just because you can. Although this does not happen often, any nasty comment is one too many.

Now is the time for a re-set. We have wonderful young people at Sacred Heart College, but after two years of Covid disruptions some have forgotten their sense of school. We want everyone who comes to our school to feel that they can be who they are unencumbered, are able to express their opinions and respectfully listen to those of others, know that they will be safe, and supported. We are asking parents for assistance with this. Here are a few points that may apply and will reinforce what we are doing here.

- Remind of the importance of manners please and thankyou is a great start
- Keep voices down inside
- Don't talk over the top of other people
- Don't swear
- Don't say mean things to anyone speak how you would like to be spoken to

TALKING TO YOUR CHILD ABOUT THE RUSSIA UKRAINE WAR

DIRECTOR OF FAITH AND MISSION - Annie O'Shannessy

Year 7 participated in their Reflection Day on Monday and Friday of this week. The purpose of the day was to get to know each other and their teacher, and to create a sense of belonging to Sacred Heart. The day began in the Chapel with prayer and then the students rotated through three activities. These were; a tour of the school looking at religious art installations, learning about the Stations of the Cross as a significant focus for the upcoming Easter Season and creating their own prayer flag.

At lunchtime the students and staff walked along the river to the Playground at the Botanical Gardens where they later picked up the bus and went out to the cemetery. The Kyneton Cemetery is an important place as so many of the Sisters of Mercy are buried there. The students learn their names and make the connection to the rich history which is Sacred Heart College. It is a wonderful day whereby the students and staff can take it slowly, walk in each other's company, and begin to really feel that they belong at Sacred Heart.

Japanese language students from Year 7-12 may have the opportunity to communicate with Shodon Junior High School or our Japanese sister school live or via video exchange later this year.




JUNIOR R E NEWS - Victoria Mackay, Religious Education Learning Area Leader (Y7-Y9)


Raising Teenage Boys in the Macedon Ranges

Year 7 Immunisations

Every day vaccination saves lives and makes it possible for Victorians to live free from the illness and disability caused by many infectious diseases. All Year 7 Victorian secondary students have the opportunity to receive the following free vaccines:

Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) – single dose Human papillomavirus (HPV) – 2 doses (minimum 6 months apart)

Year 7 2022 students at Sacred Heart College will receive their immunisations on

Monday 21 March 2022 and

Monday 10 October 2022.

Local councils deliver the program and schools distribute the vaccine information and consent card booklets.

The *Public Health and Wellbeing Regulations* authorise schools to release parent and student information to local councils so that councils can follow up with parents after the consent card booklets have been distributed.

This means that we will provide Macedon Ranges Shire Council with your contact details, and a local council immunisation representative may contact you with vaccine program information.

If you are unable to contact me by the above date, you will need to contact the immunisation officer responsible for the vaccine program at Macedon Ranges Shire Council, in the event that you have queries about your contact details.

The next step will be to read the information provided in your child's consent card booklet and complete all sections. Detach Part A with all fields completed, and return to the College. Without returning Part A of the consent card booklet, a student may miss the opportunity to be vaccinated. It is important this section is completed and returned to the school, regardless of whether you consent for your child to be vaccinated **or not** as part of the school-based program. All cards should now have been returned.

Please take into consideration when looking at booking your child a COVID-19 vaccination, that the Department of Health and Human Services recommends that a 7-day interval occurs between a COVID-19 vaccine and other vaccines.

Head Lice

There has been a reported case of head lice within the College.

Head lice are small, wingless insects that live, breed and feed on the human scalp. They do not generally carry or transmit disease. Direct contact is required for transmission from person to person. Lice will crawl from head to head without discrimination.




World Book Day - Thursday 3 March

- 3. The ability and experience to choose what they want to read
- 4. Trusted adults and peers who share and recommend books to them
- 5. The reading experience being enjoyable (often this begins with social and shared experiences with adults and peers).
- 6. Time to read at first this might need to be imposed as a routine to build a habit.
