

VAPING

Over the term there has been a very concerning trend sweeping schools across the country — vaping. We are experiencing this rise in much the same way as everywhere else. It is difficult to detect and simple to hide and by all accounts unfortunately easy to purchase. There is a misconception amongst many students as well as some parents that vaping is harmless. Information that is available regarding the longer-term effects of vaping shows that this is not the case. While the damage to the lungs is not the same as cigarette smoke, it is damaging in a different way. The chemicals used in vaping equipment are non-toxic when ingested, but not when inhaled. Medical clinics in Melbourne are now treating children who are addicted to vaping, and are seeing the beginnings of serious lung conditions. Vaping equipment and fillers are illegal to be sold to anyone under 18 years of age, and smoking and vaping are both banned by law by the Education Department of Victoria from any school grounds. I am asking for support from parents with this difficult issue. Please do not allow your child to access this equipment as it may be brought to school. It is not safe, it is illegal to occur on school grounds and it is considered the greatest precursor to the uptake of smoking cigarettes.

If a student is caught smoking or vaping at school, they will be suspended and parents will be contacted. The student will be required to complete a research task on the 'Consequences of Vaping' during their suspension. The vaping equipment will also be confiscated.

This term, students in Year 11 RE have been examining the topic of 'who am I, and who am I called to be?'



As part of their Assessment Task, our Year 11s prepared a visual representation of Christ's vision of a just society. Here is some of their work.














DEBUTANTE BALL - Lachlan Prendergast and Molly Connell Year 12

NEWS FROM THE YEAR 10 HISTORY CLASSROOM - Grace Cattanach Year 10

On Friday morning our class took part in an online excursion at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra. We were taken around the museum and shown artefacts from both of the World Wars by a curator named Claire. We were also told the story of a young girl named Grace who served as a nurse in World War One and then enlisted as a nurse in the Second World War. We assumed she made the decision to do this because of her love to help people, and because she had experience from the first war.

During our incursion we were shown a picture of a young aboriginal girl who was 12 when the bombing of Darwin occurred. We got to learn about her journey from Darwin to Adelaide. We learned that the girl named Mary, had to leave all of her things and her father behind to escape Darwin and move to somewhere safer. We saw a pack that was given out to children fleeing Darwin, and tried to imagine how little people in this situation were able to take with them and how much they had to leave behind.

At the end of our tour we saw the tomb of the unknown soldier. We learned that only two men were brought back to Australia after they died in battle, and one of their identities is still unknown. We saw the wall of poppies and learned about the conditions soldiers had to live in, through a painting. The painting showed rough rocky and dry environments, and lots of men packed into small spaces.

We learned about personal stories from the bombing of Darwin, both World War One and Two, and got to see and imagine what life during those times would have been like.





