It is another busy term with several important events coming soon and some having already occurred. Last week saw our first Mother's Day Breakfast for two years, and it was fantastic. Held over two sittings, there was a lovely ambience created by the music students. Our Hospitality students excelled, producing beautiful COVID safe breakfast packs for the participants. It was a wonderful celebration, and so pleasing to see visitors back at the College.

### **Travelling on Buses**

Even though Government COVID regulations have softened due to the low rate of infection, there are still regulations in place when travelling on public transport. The buses that our students travel on are part of the Government bus system, and carry students from several local schools. They, therefore, qualify as public transport. This means that students are required to wear a mask when travelling on the bus. Could all parents with students who are bus travellers please ensure that they have a mask with them for this purpose?

### **Changing Buses**

When students enrol at Sacred Heart College, they may be allocated a seat on a bus on the Government Bus System if there is one available. Due to a number of the Government buses becoming full to capacity, it is no longer possible for students to change buses as easily as they may have done in the past. The allocated bus is the bus that the student must normally travel on.

If a student needs to change a bus for any of the following reasons- medical appointments, sport commitments or work commitments- and there is room on the bus, they must provide a signed note explaining the reason from their parent/carer, to the bus coordinator at the College who will then generate an official Travel Pass. This pass must then be presented to the bus driver before the student will be permitted to travel on the bus. Please take note of this change if it affects your child.

### **Uniform Shop**

Due to the large number of parents and students collecting uniform items from the uniform shop Tuesdays and Thursdays, it is important to remind parents that when on the College grounds, social distancing from each other, and from any students who are not your child, is required. There have been supply shortages of some items due to Covid, so please consider contacting the Uniform Shop before collection to avoid pointless queuing.

### Semester Two Subject Changes

Semester Two subject/elective changes for Years 9, 10 and 11 will open on **Tuesday 25 May and will close on Friday 18 June**. Semester Two commences on Tuesday 13 July. Student timetables will be uploaded to SIMON by the start of Term 3, Monday 12 July.

To make a subject change for Semester 2, students will need to complete a Change of Unit/Subject Form (Year 10 - green, Year 11 - pink) obtained from outside Student Reception. Year 9 students can collect their Change of Subject Form from Jodie Wattie's office. The Change of Subject Forms will be available from Wednesday 19 May.

#### *Senior Students:*

All Change of Subject Forms require a signature from a parent/guardian and the Current Subject Teacher. Students must also provide a reason for the change. Interviews will be held during lunchtime with Mr Matthews, in O208 to determine if the change is possible, based on the subject/unit blocking and class sizes. Students are required to book a lunchtime interview on the booking sheet located outside O208 from Wednesday 19 May.

If the change of subject has a significant impact on future career plans then it is essential that students organise a Career appointment prior to their interview to discuss options. Information on the Change of Subject Process will be available to all students via Daily Messages.

The students were required, as part of an assessment task, to prepare and cook a Mother's Day Breakfast for 400 people. As some COVID restrictions are still in place, this did involve some careful planning and preparation which meant our usual buffet breakfast could not go ahead. The students decided to prepare individual boxes of treats for each of our guests. Yes, that's right....400 individual boxes were produced!

So, what did they prepare and make??

10kg granola, 2400 melting moments, 700 eggs for breakfast wraps, 10 litres of berry compote, 760 scones, 6kg bacon and they also managed to consider the various dietary requirements!

The students prepared all of this in about five hours leading up to the morning of the event. They arrived at the College at 6am to complete their preparation and pack the box of goodies to be ready for the first sitting of guests at 7am, followed by the second sitting at 8am.

This was a huge task for the class (10 students in total) to organise but they should be very proud of their achievements. The feedback was very positive and the morning was a huge success!

## Languages Week

Last week we celebrated Languages Week at SHC. The students enjoyed a range of activities - an online Languages Quiz, a lunchtime screening of *Ratatouille*, and a lunchtime Taiko performance (Japanese drums).

Our Year 7 Japanese classes were also treated to a Taiko workshop in which they were all able to participate in playing Japanese drums. Both classes conducted themselves beautifully, and used their Japanese language skills to greet and thank our Taiko instructors. The instructors were very complimentary about the Taiko skills of our students, a video of which has been posted on the SHC Facebook page.

Languages Week is a good time to remind ourselves that there are so many benefits to learning a foreign language – it improves cognitive and creative flexibility, and fosters a global mindset, all of which are highly valued by employers. Language learning has also been shown to improve academic achievement in other subject areas. I encourage you to discuss this with your young language learners at home!



**WHAT HAPPENS IN THE BRAIN WHEN YOU LEARN A LANGUAGE?**

We know that physical exercise is important, but are you giving your brain the same attention? You should be – and it turns out that learning a language is the perfect all-round workout. Here's why...

- 1. IT INCREASES THE SIZE OF CERTAIN PARTS OF YOUR BRAIN.** This includes the hippocampus, a structure deep in the brain, which helps us to learn new information and our spatial navigation.
- 2. IT MAKES YOUR BRAIN WORK BETTER.** That's right, learning a language improves brain function. As certain areas grow stronger, the connections between them improve – creating a more efficient network that aids faster learning.
- 3. IT CAN MAKE YOU BETTER AT TESTS.** People who speak more than one language tend to perform better in tests on mathematics, reading and vocabulary. They also have improved memory, especially for learning lists and sequences.
- 4. IT CAN MAKE YOU BETTER AT MAKING DECISIONS.** Studies show that people who learn multiple languages are likely to be better at decision-making. They tend to be more perceptive to their surroundings and are therefore better at distinguishing between important and misleading information.
- 5. IT CAN HELP PROVIDE GOOD MENTAL HEALTH FOR LONGER.** Learning a second language may delay the onset of dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Research suggests that learning languages has more impact in delaying cognitive decline than a person's intelligence or level of education.
- 6. IT'S NEVER TOO LATE!** The positive improvements in brain functioning and mental agility that result from learning a language can be experienced at any age.

## Dungeons and Dragons

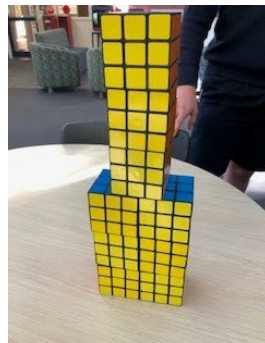
D and D is underway! Our keen group of students met formally for the first time on Tuesday and have begun creating their characters. A Google Classroom has been set up to help facilitate this group.



## Masterclasses

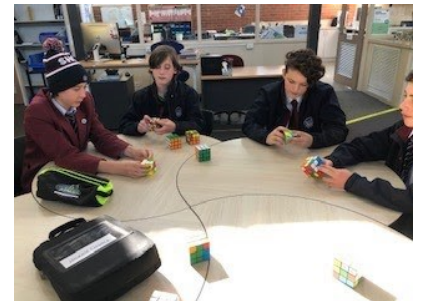

### Careers Q&A with past student Savannah Roberts

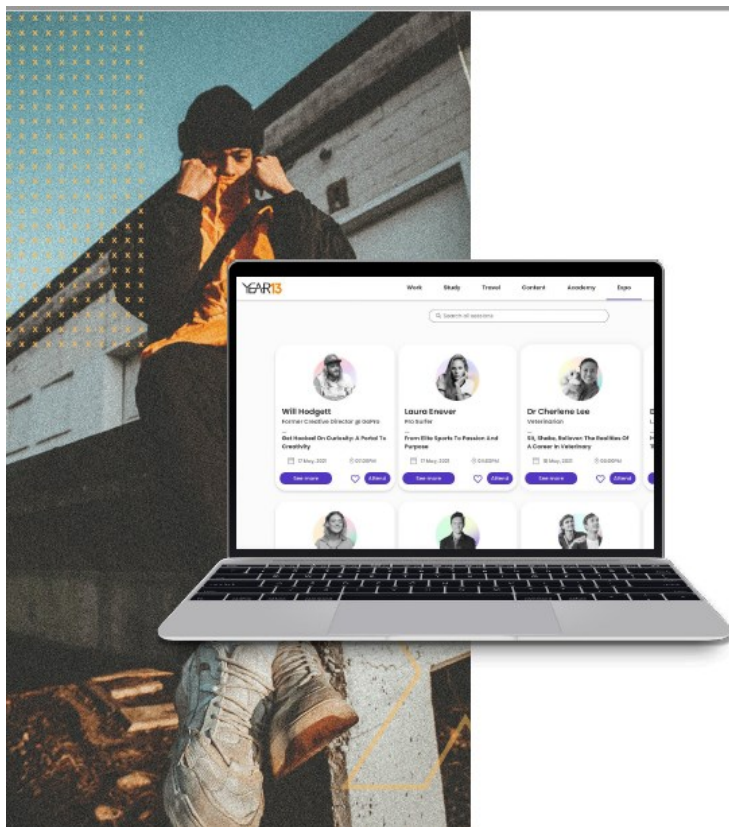
