These commemorations are always moving and continue to grow in stature notwithstanding the time that has passed since those awful years of conflict. Thank you to all students and staff who contributed to these community events in any way.
- The College came together last Thursday for its own Anzac Day commemorative service with the whole school gathering in Quambi. It was a moving tribute highlighted by the personal testimony of two Kyneton RSL branch members as well as several beautiful musical reflections by the College choir.
- Sacred Heart College was able to welcome more than 130 families to our annual Open Evening held last Thursday evening.
 Prospective students from a range of primary school levels were engaged in a wide variety of subject-based and co-curricular activities,



This term has already been remarkably busy. We were privileged to have two representatives from the Kyneton RSL, Snr Vice President Brian Turley and Robbie Renton, participating in the service, presenting the Requiem and reciting the ODE, as well as explaining the origins and value of Legacy. The RSL's involvement in our services is greatly appreciated by the students and the College.

Uniform

Winter is upon us and so the winter uniform is now required to be worn. It is worth noting that Noones have a lay-by service, which may be useful for families needing to purchase items. Sacred Heart College has a formal uniform, and it is important that parents support us by ensuring that their child has the correct items of uniform to wear. We value the uniform for several reasons, the most important ones being the level playing field it creates and the visual wellbeing indicator it provides. We enforce correct wearing of uniform as training for adhering to a dress code, and students receive a detention for the incorrect wearing. Your assistance can prevent this occurring.

Uniform - Points to Note

When representing the College, travelling to and from the College, leaving the premises during College hours, College excursions, etc., students are expected to wear their uniform correctly and completely.

Terms 2 & 3 (Winter)

Students are to wear their Blazer to and from the College. If, however, it is raining, students may wear the Navy Jacket. The Jacket can also be worn as the outer garment in the College grounds and in the classroom, over the Jumper.

We encourage the layering of the College Jumper for warmth, which should to be worn under the College Blazer during this period.

Parents will shortly receive information about the arrangements for this period, including the exam timetables, that should address any questions you may have.

Teachers will be beginning their revision in class time as we approach the examination period. It can be beneficial for parents/guardians to have conversations with students around this time to ensure that students are managing their revision well.

Semester Two Subject Changes

Semester Two subject/elective changes for Years 10 and 11 will open on Monday 22 May and will close on Tuesday 20 June. Semester Two commences on Monday 10 July. Student timetables will be uploaded to SIMON by the start of Term 3, Monday 10 July.

To enable the timetable and class numbers to be confirmed, and to meet the required VCE class attendance hours, no changes will be made after these dates. We ask that parents support us in this request.

To make a change, students will need to make an appointment with the Head of Senior School (Paul Matthews), then complete a Change of Unit/Subject Form obtained from the Senior School Google site (Senior School@SHC). Forms need to be signed by a parent/guardian and Current Subject Teacher, and a reason for the change given. Interviews will be held during recess and lunchtime with Paul Matthews, in O208 to determine if the change is possible based on the subject/unit blocking.

Any subject change that is considered to have a significant impact on future career plans will require students to organise a Career appointment prior to their interview to discuss options.

Students in 8C got creative in Ms Shennan's Maths class recently, finding ways to show square metres.


They used newspaper, plastic and even socks to help them visualise this measurement.



CSEF Applications (Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund) - Closing Date 23/06/2023
